SPACE - Supporting Parents and Children Emotionally

What Is SPACE? SPACE - Supporting Parents and Children Emotionally is an exciting collaboration between Headstart Kernow and Rockpool.

SPACE was created to help parents understand what is meant by a Trauma Informed approach and to familiarise them with the Trauma Informed language being used in schools and across organisations who are working with and supporting their children.

A programme intended for all parents SPACE aims to provide information to parents, raising awareness of trauma and how that can affect both children's and adult's emotional behaviour.

Primary school pupils and rapid asymptomatic testing

On advice from Public Health England (PHE), pupils in primary schools and children in nursery settings are not included in the rapid asymptomatic testing programme.

PHE has advised that there are currently limited public health benefits to testing primary-aged pupils with lateral flow devices (LFD). In addition, primary-aged pupils, particularly younger children, may find the LFD testing process unpleasant and are unable to self-swab.

We are advising that primary-aged pupils should only be tested if they are symptomatic, in which case their families should follow the <u>guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19)</u> infection and book a PCR test for the child.



Virtual TRLC Collaborative Art Gallery Event



The Truro, Roseland, Learning Community (TRLC) want to celebrate the abundance of creativity we have amongst our children/students. We plan to produce a TRLC programme to support the Awards Celebration Event (e copy format) for this year and will require some amazing artwork from the children/students to adorn it. - A4 portrait orientation only
- The A4 composition can use any art medium, pastel, charcoal, watercolour, screen print no restrictions
- Entries must be the handed to Mrs Andrews by Friday 23 April
- On the front of the artwork we will need to see the child's full name (the winning entries will also have an acknowledgement using their name and school in the programme)
- We will need consent from the parent to use the artwork and full name from children/students to be used for the purposes outlined above.







Your School Nurse

Your child can have access to a School Nurse at any time if you have any health concerns, in addition your School Nurse offers a full health assessment in reception and year 6.

The School Nurse can check:

- Your child is growing healthily and support with healthy eating
- Support with access to dental care and general support for dental hygiene
- Help with day / night time wetting or soiling
- Provide information about immunisations
- Guidance re healthy lifestyles
- Support with general hygiene issues including head lice and worms
- Support with general emotional health issues
- Support to access other health professionals
- Routines, including sleep

Additionally in Year 6:

- Friendships
- Relationships
- Development, including periods and puberty
- Access to specialist services including dietician, healthy weight programmes and voluntary services
- Developmental issues
- Transition to secondary school
- Healthy lifestyles


